WISCONSIN EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (WERA)

- Title V Section 501 of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 created the Emergency Rental Assistance (ERA) Program, administered by the U.S. Department of the Treasury, and provided a total of \$25 billion in federal assistance to assist households that are unable to pay rent and utilities due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- The funds are provided directly to States, U.S. Territories, local governments, and Indian tribes. Wisconsin received a total of \$386,777,592 in federal ERA funding.
- The Act *stipulated* that any unit of general government with a population of at least 200,000 would receive a proportionate share of the State's total allotment of funds. Eligible units of government in Wisconsin include the counties of: Brown, Dane, Milwaukee and Waukesha and the cities of Madison and Milwaukee. In total, these units of government received \$64,603,547 in funding with the remaining \$322,174,044 to be administered by the State of Wisconsin.



WISCONSIN EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (WERA) - ELIGIBILITY

Funding under the Act may only be awarded to assist households that pay rent and meet all the following criteria:

ERA1

- Household qualifies for unemployment <u>or</u> has experienced a reduction in household income, incurred significant costs, or experienced a financial hardship due to COVID-19; and
- One or more individuals within the household can demonstrate a risk of experiencing homelessness or housing instability; and
- Has a household income at or below 80 percent of the county median.
- Eligible households may receive up to 12 months of assistance, plus an additional 3 months if the grantee determines the extra months are needed to ensure housing stability and grantee funds are available.



WISCONSIN EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (WERA) - ELIGIBILITY

On May 7th, Treasury announced an additional \$21.6 billion under the American Rescue Plan for Emergency Assistance

The State of Wisconsin's total allocation was \$306,039,006; state portion w/o entitlements \$254,921,242.

NINE enhanced policies to directly aid renters, prevent evictions and help American's stabilize housing were identified in the new funding.

ERA2

- One or more individuals within the household has qualified for unemployment benefits or experienced a reduction in household income, incurred significant costs, or experienced other financial hardship during or due, directly or indirectly, to the coronavirus pandemic;
- Demonstrates a risk of experiencing homelessness or housing instability; and
- Has a household income at or below 80 percent of the county median.

WERA Eligible Expenses

- Rent assistance
- Rental arrears
- Utility and home energy costs (Internet as of 7/7/21 Water Coming SOON)
- Utility and home energy arrears
- Housing Stability Services which may include case management and other services intended to keep households stably housed
- Administrative costs





WISCONSIN EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (WERA) – PARNTERSHIP AND HOW TO APPLY

- DEHCR partnered with the Wisconsin Community Action Program Association (WISCAP), the local Community Action Agencies, and Energy Services, Inc. to administer WERA
- DEHCR partnered with United Migrant Opportunity Services (UMOS) to provide outreach to approximately 2,500 farmworkers across 27 counties

- 14 postcards with specific CAP agency contact information tracked via QR code and specific Bitly
- Reaches households with no internet access.



Continued Outreach Efforts

- The Wisconsin Eviction Data Project is produced by the <u>Interagency Council on Homelessness</u> to track, on a monthly basis, the number of eviction filings and judgements for eviction in all 72 counties in the state to track the state's housing economy, the efficacy of homelessness prevention programs, and to inform the public on housing policy needs throughout Wisconsin.

CDC TEMPORARY ORDER TO HALT EVICTIONS

On August 3rd, the CDC issued a new order temporarily halting evictions in counties with heightened levels of community transmission.

Per the CDC's website, all counties in Wisconsin are experiencing either "substantial" or "high" levels of community transmission

As of August 9, 2021, the following counties DO NOT qualify for the CDC moratorium:

Ashland, Douglas, Florence, Grant, Green, Lafayette, Taylor and Waushara

Important Information to know:

- If a county covered by the moratorium "no longer experiences substantial or high levels of community transmission for 14 consecutive days, then this Order will no longer apply in that county, unless and until the county again experiences substantial or high levels of community transmission while this Order is in effect."
- Any eviction actions initiated, but not yet completed, since the end of the previous moratorium (July 31) is subject to this order. Eviction judgements that have been issued since then are not subject to the order.

WISCONSIN EMERGENCY RENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (WERA)

Where are we at today NATIONALLY?

- As of the end of June (Treasury's latest report), Wisconsin ranked 13th nationally for overall expenditures according to the U.S. Department of the Treasury.
- More than \$1.5 Billion in assistance was delivered to eligible households in the month of JUNE this is more than the assistance provided in al three previous reporting periods combined.
- Number of HH served grew by 85% over the previous month and nearly tripled since April. In June alone, 290,000 HH were served, up from 160,000 in May and approximately 100,000 in April.
