3B. Project Description

1. Provide a description that addresses the entire scope of the proposed project.

Youth and young adults will be served through this program in the following ways. The BOS proposes to hire a System Navigator for each coalition. Thus, the Rural North (RN) and West Central (WC) Homeless Coalition will each have a dedicated YHDP individual working within each Coalition to ensure that the four major goals (Stable Housing, Permanent Connections, Education and Employment and Social Emotional Well-being) and objectives identified in the Coordinated Community Plan (CCP) are being implemented. But, in addition to the BOS funded System Navigator, this project proposes to hire 2 FTE YHDP Case Managers, each responsible for three counties in each coalition, who will work in tandem with System Navigators to address the CCP goals, objectives and action steps. Thus, Case Managers, System Navigators, and others interfacing with homeless Y/YA's will be trained in Positive Youth Development, Trauma-informed Care, cultural competence, and mobility mentoring. Navigators and Case Managers will be responsible for facilitating initiatives directly and indirectly impacting Y/YA's.

1a. Provide a description that addresses how this project will follow Positive Youth Development.

Positive youth development (PYD) is a comprehensive framework outlining the supports all young people need to be successful. Program staff, who will be trained in PYD will understand the importance of creating a caring and supportive environment. The staff will work with clients to develop soft skills through skill building activities. We will link youth to positive adult role models. In addition, we will foster activities that will make the youth feel included regardless of gender, sexual orientation, disability, or other factors. A safe space will be tailored to fit the needs of each youth.

1b. Provide a description that addresses how this project will follow Trauma Informed Care.

Staff will be trained in Trauma Informed Care which will require that YHDP staff realize the widespread impact of trauma and understand paths for recovery. As a case manager we will need to have a complete picture of the youths life situation, past and present, to provide effective care services. We will actively avoid re-traumatization by working with five key areas.

1. Patient empowerment: Using the individual strength of each youth to empower them in the development of their own plan.
2. Informing clients: Provide options so they can choose the option they prefer.
3. Collaboration: Maximizing collaboration between patients, community resources, mentors and other programs that fit the need of each youth.
4. Safety: We will Develop safe settings and activities that ensure the physical and emotional safety of each youth.
5. Trustworthiness: Creating clear expectations with the youth addressing how services will be provided.

1c. How does this project help the community meet the shared vision, goals and objectives of the coordinated community plan?

This project helps the community meet the shared vision, goals and objectives of the CCP through raising critical consciousness awareness in the larger community of the needs of homeless Y/YA's. Our program model is Transitional Housing /Rapid Re-Housing. The goal of this program is to stabilize the youth during their stay in a transitional housing unit. During this period, the caseworker will address the immediate needs of the client. This may include AODA or mental health services, Counseling to deal with past trauma or preparing the youth for employment. One of our goals during this period is just transitional housing unit, they will transition into the Rapid Re-housing program. During this period, they will receive less support from their case manager. Case manager services will continue to decline based on the needs of the client. There will be some back and forth during this time, youth will push back not requiring much case management or will request additional help. The youth they will determine how much or how little support they will need from the case manager. As we reduce the need for case management and other supportive services, the youth will begin to move into independent living. Keeping in mind the major goal of this program is to eliminate youth homelessness in our community.

5a. Describe the racial composition of the persons or households who are expected to benefit from your proposed grant activities, including a description of how you analysed the local population to determine this.

Rural Wisconsin, like many rural areas in the United States, can have a predominantly white population. According to historical data, individuals of European descent have often populated Wisconsin's rural areas. Based on the current census data our service area consists of 91.7 % white, .8% Black, 4.6% American Indian. We have provided services to 80.7% white, 1.7% black and 12.19 % Native American. We continue to provide training on cultural competency to meet the needs of this vulnerable population.

5b. Identify any potential barriers to persons or communities of color equitably benefiting from your proposed grant activities.

In any grant activity, ensuring equitable distribution of benefits our fundamental goal. Many things come into play including historical injustices and systemic racism. Negative stereotypes or stigmas associated with certain racial or ethnic groups can also be an issue. Another issue may include a lack of diverse representation in the planning and implementation of grant activities. Rural areas can sometimes be isolated, making it challenging for individuals to access grant activities. Persons or communities of color might lack access to information about available grant opportunities due to language barriers.

5c. Detail the steps you will take to prevent, reduce or eliminate these barriers.

To prevent, reduce, or eliminate the barriers that may hinder persons or communities of color from benefiting equitably from proposed grant activities in rural Wisconsin, a comprehensive approach is necessary. The first step is to ensure that the planning and decision-making processes involve a diverse group of stakeholders, including individuals from different racial and ethnic backgrounds. We will provide cultural competency training to all staff and volunteers involved in the grant activities. Materials will be available to ensure that all materials, information, and communication related focus on understanding cultural differences, addressing biases, and fostering an inclusive environment. We recognize geographical challenges and provide virtual participation options for those who cannot attend in person.

5d. Describe the measures in place to track progress and evaluate the effectiveness of efforts to advance racial equity through the grant activities.

First, we developed specific quantitative metrics tied to our equity goal. We regularly analyze demographic data to assess whether there is an equitable distribution of opportunities, resources, and benefits among different racial and ethnic groups. We collect data using the Clarity HMIS system. We generate regular progress reports detailing achievements, challenges, and action plans.

We implement a multi-tiered support system that provides different levels of intervention based on family needs. We start by conducting comprehensive assessments of each youth's individual needs, preferences, and goals. Youth are provided with clear and unbiased information about available service providers and interventions. We work collaboratively with the youth to develop customized service plans. We create a diverse network of service providers. Our program offers a variety of evidence-based interventions that address different needs, such as housing support, mental health services, educational assistance, employment training, and life skills development. We offer advocacy support to youth who encounter challenges with their chosen providers.

3. How will the project respond to the different needs for service type, intensity, and length of supports for youth?

We start by conducting thorough and individualized needs assessments for each youth. This assessment should cover a wide range of areas, including housing, mental health, education, employment, family dynamics, and personal goals. Based on the assessment, develop personalized service plans that align with each youth's unique needs, strengths, and goals. We offer a diverse menu of services and interventions that cater to different needs. We adjust the intensity of services based on the severity of the youth's needs. We adapt service plans and interventions as the youth's circumstances evolve. We empower youth to actively participate in planning the intensity and length of their supports. We collaborate closely with other service providers, agencies, and organizations that specialize in various areas of support. We have a crisis response plan in place to address urgent situations that may arise.

Based on the assessment and gap analysis, draft revised versions of the HMIS and Policies and Procedures are made. Submit the final version is submitted to the Social Service Director for approval.

Sanctions may include but are not limited to a formal letter of reprimand, suspension of system privileges, revocation of system privileges and criminal prosecution. If possible, all confirmed security violations will be communicated in writing to the affected client within 14 days, unless the client cannot be located. If the client cannot be located, a written description of the violation and efforts to locate the client will be prepared by the SystemAdministrator at the Institute for Community Alliances and placed in the client's file at the Agency that originated the client's record. Any agency that is found to have consistently and/or flagrantly violated security procedures may have their access privileges suspended or revoked. All sanctions are imposed by the ICA HMIS staff. All sanctions may be appealed to the HMIS Advisory Board. Users and Designated Agency HMIS Contacts should report all unlawful access of HMIS and unlawful attempted access of HMIS. This includes theft of usernames and passwords. Security incidents should be reported to the ICA System Administrator. New in FY2023, the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) has clarified the use of CoC Program funds for VAWA eligible cost categories. These VAWA cost categories can be added to a new project application to create a CoC VAWA Budget Line Item (BLI) in e-snaps and eLOCCS. - Security Deposits. Grant funds can be used to pay for security deposits of the safe unit the survivor is transferring to via an emergency transfer(s).
- Utilities. Grant funds can be used to pay for costs of establishing utility assistance in the safe unit the survivor is transferring to.
- Housing Fees. Grant funds can be used to pay fees associated with getting survivors into a safe unit via emergency transfer(s), including but not limited to application fees, broker fees, holding fees, trash fees, pet fees where the person believes they need their pet to be safe, etc.
- Case Management. Grant funds can be used to pay staff time necessary to assess, coordinate, and implement emergency transfer(s).
- Housing Navigation. Grant funds can be used to pay staff time necessary to identify safe units and facilitate moves into housing for survivors through emergency transfer(s).
- Technology to make an available unit safe. Grant funds can be used to pay for technology that the individual believes is needed to make the unit safe, including but not limited to doorbell cameras, security systems, phone, and internet service when necessary to support security systems for the unit, etc.

B. VAWA Confidentiality Requirements. Examples of eligible costs for ensuring compliance with VAWA confidentiality requirements include:

- Monitoring and evaluating compliance.
- Developing and implementing strategies for corrective actions and remedies to ensure compliance.
- Program evaluation of confidentiality policies, practices, and procedures.
- Training on compliance with VAWA confidentiality requirements.
- Reporting to CoC Collaborative Applicant, HUD, and other interested parties on compliance with VAWA confidentiality requirements.
- Costs for establishing methodology to protect survivor information.
- Staff time associated with maintaining adherence to VAWA confidentiality requirements.
